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### Hemp or Marijuana?







**Hemp:** the plant Cannabis sativa L. and any part of that plant, including the seeds thereof and all derivatives, extracts, cannabinoids, isomers, acids, salts, and salts of isomers, whether growing or not, with a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of not more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis.



**Cannabinoid ("CBD"):** compound of cannabis.

Purported benefits include relief from pain and anxiety relief. Does not make users feel "high" or "stoned."



Tetrahydrocannabinol ("THC"): compound that is the main physiologically active ingredient of cannabis.

Makes users feel "high" or "stoned."

### **Basics of the Farm Bill**

- Removes hemp from definition of "marihuana" in the Controlled Substances Act ("CSA")
- Means that hemp is not a Schedule I controlled substance under the CSA
- No effect on state-legalized marijuana programs, whether medical or recreational



### Basics of the Farm Bill Cont'd

- State and Tribal governments have primary regulatory authority over production of hemp, if they so choose
- Must submit plan to the US Department of Agriculture ("Dept of Ag")
- Dept of Ag plan applies in States/Tribal jurisdictions in which no State/tribal plan
- Dept of Ag is drafting regulations



### **Response From the FDA**

#### Expressly does not affect FDA's jurisdiction under the Food, Drug, and Cosmetics Act ("FDCA")

### **Response From the FDA Cont'd**

**December 20, 2018 Statement from FDA:** 

- Treats cannabis products like all other FDA-regulated products
- Therapeutic benefit claim → FDA approval needed before introduction into interstate commerce
- Intended for use in diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of diseases → New drug; FDA approval needed before marketed in US



### **Response From the FDA Cont'd**

December 20, 2018 Statement from FDA, cont'd:

- CBD and THC are active ingredients in FDA-approved drug
- Food containing CBD/THC introduced in interstate commerce → Illegal
- Foods containing hemp, but not CBD/THC → Generally legal
- Marketing CBD/THC as dietary supplements → Illegal
